

SUSTAINABLE HENFIELD 2030

Do you have items lurking at home that are no longer useful to you? Before you throw them away, check-out whether you can recycle them at one of our amazing high street shops. By doing this you will be helping to keep Henfield plastic free, keep items out of landfill and to raise money for charities!



All Things Covered are collecting old laptops, tablets and iPads to sell and raise money for the Henfield Haven



Bespoke Interiors are also raising money for the Henfield Haven by collecting old printer cartridges for recycling.



Budgens, Hamfelds and One-Stop and all collect used household batteries which are then recycled to recover the raw materials.



Christina's Afternoon Tea Shop will accept donations of stamps or stamp collections which will then be sold to raise money for the Henfield Haven.



Cornerweighs is supporting the Horsham Springboard project by collecting plastic milk bottle tops on their behalf to be recycled.



Gallery BN5 and Henfield Haven are collecting old mobile phone to raise money for the Henfield Haven.



Goodness Henfield are supporting Terracycle by collecting old pens (of any kind) and empty glue sticks which are then recycled into new pens and other products.



Henfield Club are supporting Sussex homeless people by collecting unwanted tents, sleeping bags and rucksacks.



Henfield Eyecare will accept your old or damaged glasses which are sent by the Henfield Lions to be re-used by those in need. They also take contact lenses (and their packaging) which can be recycled into plastic furniture.



Henfield Tea Gardens/Jam Pot collect plastic milk bottle lids to send to Protomax who recycle them into plastic furniture. They also collect ring-pulls from drinks cans to support the Purple Community Fund.



Hobbs will take old coins and bank notes (any currency) to be sold to raise money for the Henfield Haven.



Lloyds Pharmacy accept used inhalers to ensure they are disposed of appropriately.



Pinks Hairdressers collect unused and unopened toiletries which are donated to the Oasis Project in Brighton. (please keep them until they can receive them in the shop)



Radmalls Funeral Service are taking unwanted hearing aids and accessories which are sent to be re-furbished and then re-used by those in need.



Southdown Galleries are collecting cameras (video or film), sat navs, games consoles and games, MP3 players, watches and jewellery to sell and raise money for Henfield Haven



Stokes Newsagents are collecting bras in good condition to support the Oxfam 'Frip Ethique' project in Senegal.



In addition to these wonderful local shops, celiaexplorer@btinternet.com is collecting sleeping bags, tents, mens clothes (medium jeans, size 7-9 trainers and new underpants) as well as unused toiletries and sunscreen to support refugees in Calais.
